International Team Unearth Important Discovery in Xuantunich



This summer a team of international archaeologists found a burial tomb that appears to be from the Snake dynasty while digging behind a staircase in Xunentunich, a Mayan ceremonial center in the Cayo District.. According to media reports the temple may have been constructed to enclose one of the largest royal Mayan tombs to be discovered in Belize.

Among the human remains were the bones of a jaguar and a deer, jade beads, 13 obsidian blades (made from naturally occurring volcanic glass) and 36 ceramic vessels. The body itself appeared to be a young male probably less than 30 years of age. There were two offerings that contained 9 more obsidian blades and 28 figurines, suggesting the man was someone of importance.

The tomb itself measured 14.7' x 7.9', making it the largest burial tomb to have been discovered in Belize since excavations began in the late 19th century. Hieroglyphics found inside the tomb are associated with the Snake dynasty, a family that ruled the Maya empire 1300 years ago. The panels may reveal more

about the tensions between the Snake heads and the Lords of Narango, both dynasties reigned in the 7th century A.D.

You can visit the ruins by taking a short 45 minute flight on Tropic Air from San Pedro, our sister city, to the Maya flats airstrip taking in the breathtaking scenery of Belize flying over both water and mountains.

Congratulations Barbados on 50th Anniversary!

Barbados kicked off its 50th anniversary celebration the beginning of 2016 and despite a rain delay for the official festivities on Independence Day everyone had a great time. Yes, it rained on November 30. Among the many activities was a grand parade starting at Kensington Oval and weaving through Bridgetown past St. Mary along Broad Street to the Parliament Building where Prime Minister Freundel Stuart saluted from the grand stand. There was also the unveiling ceremony for the 50th Anniversary of independence Monument at the Garrison Savannah which includes a time capsule and the flag will be flown 24 hours a day.

There was a cocktail reception at Ilaro Court, the Prime Minister's residence showcasing Barbado's rich cultural heritage and a black tie gala, a Mass of Thanksgiving featuring a musical prelude, and a Golden Anniversary Mega Concert. Of course, there were scores of events all through the year capturing all the pride and industry of Barbados and its people. A unique event was the One People, One Barbados Human Chain Link which even the Prime Minister joined.

EU Referendum and Northern England

Exit polls following the EU Referendum revealed a sense of being left behind by many working class voters. Districts in the north brought the leave votes over the top. This was especially true in Doncaster where the voter turnout was 69.5%. Doncaster voters

favored leaving the EU 2:1 with 104,260 votes cast to leave and 46,922 votes to stay. Doncaster's neighboring districts had similar results though Sheffield voters were more evenly divided on the issue.

In an interview with the Doncaster Free Press, former Doncaster mayor, Peter Davies said, "You can't put 28 nations together with different cultures and languages and pretend it's going to work..." For other who voted to leave the issue was more directly tied to the loss of mining jobs and the automation of many other jobs creating uncertainty.

Following the election there was a marked increase in hate crimes reported in London and a stunned European community over the results of the referendum and its implications. There was a clear division between southern and northern England. Indie filmmaker Sheena Sumaria (Guerra Films) traveled to

and reasons behind the strong Leave Campaign in the region. The 11 minute documentary can be viewed on Vimeo – "Why we voted to leave: voices from Northern England." This short film provides some insights into the cultural and economic divide that led to England leaving the EU.

In March Wilmington will host a live video conference with speakers from Doncaster and Wilmington to talk about Brexit and what led to it. More information on the date and time will be available early in 2017.
